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Objectives of the Spine Section

The objective of the Spine Section is to foster the use of spinal neurosurgical methods for the treatment of diseases of the spinal neural elements, the spine and peripheral nerves, and to advance spinal neurosurgery and relates sciences, to improve patient care, to support meaningful basic and clinical research, to provide leadership in undergraduate and graduate continuing education, and to promote administrative facilities necessary to achieve these goals.

Website News

The Spine Section website, www.spinesection.org, has made many advances to become more interactive for its members. By signing in with your membership login, members gain access to areas of the website.

- A new "Topic of the Week" Section was started in June that provides weekly reviews of spine and peripheral nerve topics, covering anatomy, neurology, neurosurgery, biology, critical care and pathology. These short questionanswer reviews help keep members up to date on current topics, and are a great review for oral or written boards.
- The Spine Section website also keeps you informed on current practice topics, with position statements on recent topics, including video-assisted thoracic surgery, and the use of hypothermia in spinal cord injury. In addition, users can view recent updates from the Washington Committee on the current health care debate, and also practice related content, such as the Spine Section's Lumbar Fusion Guidelines.

Video History

For the 25th anniversary meeting of the AANS/CNS Section on Disorders of the Spine and Peripheral Nerves, a video history was compiled of interviews with all of the past chairmen of the Spine Section. This wonderful compilation gives a unique perspective on the issues which confronted each of these chairmen, and shows a chronology of how the field of spine and peripheral nerve surgery has changed over the years, directly from leaders in the field. Awards and Fellowships

The Spine Section supports fellowship and research funding through a number of awards. These awards range from \$500 to \$50,000 each, and can help support individual research projects up to fellowships. Four fellowship awards are available, including two international fellowship awards. In addition, three research grants are available each year, the Apfelbaum Award, the Kline Award, and the Larson Award.

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These awards range from \$15,000 to \$30,000 to support grant proposals and collection of pilot data. Also, the Spine Section has created new Clinical Trial Proposal and Fellowship awards, to support the creation of clinical trials related to spine and peripheral nerve surgery.
